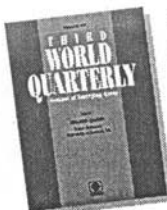

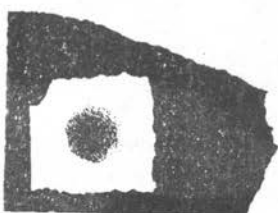

Women's Studies and Studies of Women in Africa During the 1990s

Amina Mama

Following an introduction which situates African women's studies in the context of international feminism, regional political and institutional conditions, the first section addresses recent publications in the general field of state and politics, from precolonial times to the present. Section two reviews a range of material grouped under the heading of cultural studies: namely studies of women and gender dynamics in the areas of religion and sexuality, and the innovative women-speak research favoured by the women's movement, often referred to as 'Herstories'. Section three is devoted to a consideration of the historical and contemporary literature on all aspects of women's involvement in various spheres of work and the economy.

To conclude, the author questions the relationship between women's studies and the women's movement in Africa, highlighting the importance of developing an activist intellectual tradition in which African women's studies emanate from the concerns of interests of the African women's movement, and are directed towards the positive transformation of African gender relations.

Globalization and Social Policy in Africa: Issues and Research Directions

Tade A. Aina

This working paper or CODESRIA Green Book is concerned with examining the relationship between Globalization and Social Policy in Africa.

It not only aims at offering some understanding of the two processes by themselves along with the issues their study embodies and raises, but also identifying ambiguities and gaps, and the several directions, their studies are taking. The review reveals that there are several agendas in the study of the subject, not all clear and explicit, but definitely related to larger questions such as ideologies, politics, geography and other forms of identities and vested interests.

The work commences with clarifying and challenging the notions of globalization and social policy as well as identifying some trends and dynamics in their study. Some important issues such as state-society relations, inequality and poverty, gender relations, economic restructuring and social change, and citizenship and rights are examined. This Working Paper concludes with a call for methodological orientations and analyses which are open, critical and sufficiently resilient to engage multiple and plural theoretical and comparative questions in relevant and meaningful analyses and in equally productive directions.

Quinze ans après l'adoption des programmes d'ajustement, le marché du travail est l'un des secteurs qui a le plus ressenti les effets de cette politique.

Depuis 1980, la crise s'est traduite par de nombreuses pertes d'emplois et une réduction sensible des recrutements de l'Etat, principal employeur. La déprime de l'emploi dans le secteur industriel illustre également la crise prolongée qui affecte l'économie du pays.

Ce livre est le fruit d'une collaboration entre chercheurs universitaires et professionnels qui se sont engagés à mener une réflexion critique sur l'ajustement structurel et l'emploi au Sénégal.

Cette recherche collective éclaire la problématique de la relance économique au Sénégal. Elle établit qu'à elle seule, la

politique d'ajustement par la main-d'oeuvre, faite de pression sur le facteur travail et de réforme du Code du travail, ne saurait être une panacée destinée à tonifier l'économie sénégalaise.

Coordonnateur de cette étude, **Babacar Fall** est maître-assistant au département d'histoire et de géographie de l'Ecole normale supérieure de l'Université Cheikh Anta Diop. Coordonnateur du Groupe pour l'étude et l'enseignement de la population (GEEP), il dirige aussi une expérience pilote de promotion de l'éducation à la vie familiale dans les cycles moyen et secondaire des établissements sénégalais.

Auteur de nombreux articles, notamment dans le domaine du travail, de l'éducation et de la population, il est l'auteur de *Le travail forcé en Afrique occidentale française (1900 - 1946)* (Karthala, Paris, 1993).
