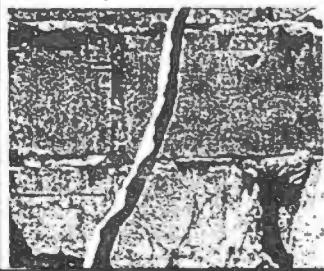



No one can fail to be aware of the incredible impact that the IMF and the World Bank have had on Africa. Their structural adjustment programmes were deliberately designed to shock African economies into free market reform and ensuing stability. But when 'getting the prices right' first swamped the World Bank's African economic plans in the early 1980s, few bothered to analyse the politics of a reform package whose immediate impact was violent and unsettling.

While Africa has come a long way since then, the goal of market reform must be as important as the task of understanding the politics of unleashing the forces of the market. Not least, is the question of democratisation, which the Bank itself now attempts to force through with loan conditions.

This book is the culmination of intense debate by African authors across the continent. Three sections make up a comprehensive analysis of adjustment regimes, their perspectives and the political context in which they have survived, or not. Country case studies in both Anglophone and Francophone Africa round up the analysis.

Thandika Mkandawire is the Executive Secretary of the Council for the Development of Social Science Research in Africa, Dakar, Senegal. His recent publications include *Africa's Recovery in the 1990s: From Stagnation and Adjustment to Human Development* (co-edited with G. A. Cornia and R. Van der Hoeven, 1992 UNICEF).

Adebayo O. Olukoshi is Associate Research Professor at the Nigerian Institute of International Affairs, Lagos, Nigeria. He is graduated from Ahmadu Bello University, Zaria, Nigeria, and Leeds University, England. He has published extensively on Nigeria's contemporary political economy. His most recent publication is a book he co-edited on *Structural Adjustment in West Africa*.

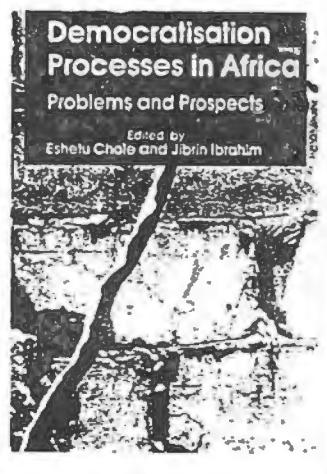

This book is a selection of papers presented at the Seventh General Assembly of CODESRIA (Dakar, 10-14 February 1992). It is a presentation by African scholars of reflections and cross-sectional analyses of the social, political and economic transformations that have shaken Africa since the end of the 1980s.

Some of the authors of this book have been closely associated with CODESRIA's activities and have largely contributed to developing and consolidating its scientific credibility. 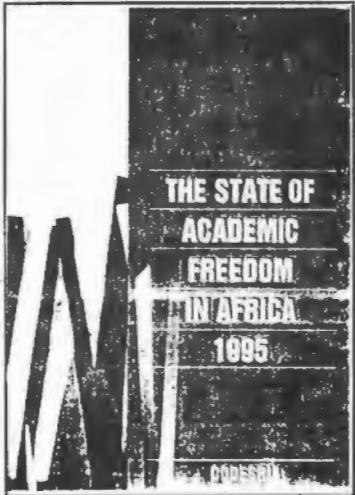
